

- \* Thanks to DCJ's hard work in passing SB 242, hundreds of people with criminal histories across Delaware voted for the first time in the September primary and November general election
- \* Delaware's death penalty was ruled unconstitutional
- \* More than 7,000 people have listened to our "Remaking 'Murdertown'" podcast, and it has prompted dozens of important conversations in our community
